- 1. Economic indicators are not positive. Merafong / Eskom have a daily load reductions between all wards wreaking havoc in the No new development, and unemployment is an ever-increasing problem.
- 2. The state of Merafong City Council, Finances and governance is despondent and the current mismanagement and double standard in credit control and the failing of the payment incentive scheme is already a disaster where Merafong cannot pay the basic accounts. The Provincial and National finance department that should intervene and play an integral function in the administration of Merafong is non-existing. Merafong Sec 71 April report is a horror story, the Credit Control for 2024/2025 useless if not equally applied.
- 3. State involvement and basic inclusion of Fochville in the IDP. As reported last month the mayor and her representatives did not honor the IDP public participation meeting. Instead, the kicked of with a roadshow trying to tell us a lot of nonsense and ultimately no projects of any IDP / Budget for Fochville.
- 4. Local Businesses are struggling.
- 5. The total properties for sale are also high and indicative of people not happy staying and working in Fochville under the current management from Merafong. Property24 and Private property listed around 206 properties in the current market available for sale. The only entity that thinks business is striving and well in Fochville is the Merafong and Wets Rand IDP / Annual reports.
- 6. The IDP / Budget is defective in the manner as it is not taking the high court decision (attached) declaring the tariff increase for Eskom invalid.

By compiling and analyzing these various sources of data and information, it is my humble opinion that Fochville economics is in a downward spiral with no prospects for any sustainable new developments, LED project or any growth in the foreseeable future.

ORDER

The Court orders, with reasons to follow, that:

- [1] The normal rules concerning form and service are dispensed with and the application is heard and decided as a matter of urgency.
- [2] The first respondent's mechanism for approval of municipal electricity tariffs as set out in the Notice to Municipal Licenced Electricity Distributers, 29 January 2024 (Annexure "FA8" to the Founding Affidavit) is declared to be unlawful, invalid and of no force and effect.
- [3] For the 2024/2025 municipal financial year, the first respondent shall consider and, if they are legally compliant, approve such electricity tariff applications by municipalities as are based on the municipalities' cost of supply studies timeously submitted in accordance with the Notice to2000/urfloip218 Licenced Electricity Distributers, 17 November 2023 (Annexure "FA7" to the Founding Affidavit). A list of such municipalities, totalling 66, is attached hereto as Annexure A.
- [4] The first respondent is prohibited from considering and approving municipal electricity tariffs for the 2024/2025 municipal financial year and subsequent municipal financial years where the municipalities' applications for the approval of municipal electricity tariffs are not in accordance with the *Notice to Municipal Licenced Electricity Distributers*, 17 November 2023.
- [5] No municipality shall be entitled to levy increased electricity tariffs upon endconsumers until such time as the first respondent has granted an approval of an application, in accordance with the *Notice to Municipal Licenced Electricity Distributers*, 17 November 2023.
- [6] Any municipality for whom the first respondent has not granted an approval of an application supported by a cost of supply study in accordance with the *Notice to Municipal Licenced Electricity Distributers*, 17 November 2023, shall be entitled to continue levying electricity rate tariffs on the same tariff as that applicable during the 2023/24 municipal financial year, subject to paragraph 7.
- [7] Municipalities shall be permitted to supplement electricity tariff applications with cost of supply studies in accordance with the *Notice to Municipal Licenced Electricity*

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Distributers, 17 November 2023, and the first respondent shall consider and, if they are legally compliant and in accordance with the *Notice to Municipal Licenced Electricity Distributers* 17 November 2023, approve such electricity tariff applications by municipalities, within one month of receipt of the requisite cost of supply studies. Municipalities are afforded 60 days from the date of this order to make such a compliant application to the first respondent.

[8] The first respondent shall pay the applicant and the second respondent's costs of the application, including the costs consequent upon the employment of two advocates, that of senior counsel on Scale C and that of junior counsel on Scale B, in terms of

Purpose

The purpose of this report is to inform the ward committee that no financial report can be submitted for the month, seeing that the section 71 report was not received and is also not available on the municipal website as required by law.

Background

As previously reported to the ward committee, municipal financial reports are required in accordance with the applicable legislation.

In terms of **Section 71(d)** of the MFMA, the accounting officer of a municipality must by no later than 10 working days after the end of each month submit to the mayor of the municipality and the relevant National and Provincial Treasury, a statement in the prescribed format on the state of the municipality's budget reflecting certain particulars for that month for the financial year up to the end of that month.

In terms **of section 72**, the accounting officer must submit a Mid-year Budget and Performance assessment report by 25 January.

In terms of **section 52** of the MFMA, the Mayor of the municipality must within 30 days of the end of each quarter submit a report to the council on the implementation of the budget and financial position of the municipality.

The above compliance reports must be made public in terms of **section 21A** of the Municipal Systems Act.

As the ward committee member responsible for the Finance portfolio, it is important that the municipal financial reports, in accordance with the mentioned legislation, be obtained to analyse and inform the ward councillor of any concerns to be addressed by council that may impact on service delivery in the ward in accordance with the Service Delivery and Budget Implementation Plan (SDBIP).

In terms of the provisions of section 21B of the Municipal Systems Act, a municipality must establish its own official website and place on the official website information required to be made public in terms of this act and the MFMA.

Discussion

It is a serious concern that despite making the committee and ward councilor aware of the legal compliance requirements pertaining to financial reporting, the status quo of non-compliance remains. It is a further concern that the oversight structures of council are failing to ensure compliance.

This renders the functioning of the ward committee null and void and a complete waste of time and resources.

It has also been noted in the press that in a ruling of the High Court of South Africa, Gauteng Division, an order was granted in favor of the applicant, being AfriForum NPC on 28 June 2024 *inter alia*, that:

- For the 2024/2025 financial year, NERSA shall consider and, if they are legally compliant, approve such electricity tariff applications by municipalities as are based on the municipalities' cost of supply studies timeously submitted in accordance with the *Notice to Municipal Licensed Electricity distributers, 17 November 2023.* (A list of 66 municipalities, which excludes Merafong City LM is attached to the order.)
- NERSA is prohibited from considering and approving municipal electricity tariffs for the 2024/2025 financial year and subsequent financial years where the municipalities' application for approval of municipal electricity tariffs are not in accordance with the Notice to Municipal Licensed Electricity distributers, 17 November 2023.
- no municipality shall be entitled to levy increased electricity tariffs upon endconsumers until such time the NERSA has granted an approval of an application in accordance with the Notice to Municipal Licensed Electricity distributers, 17 November 2023.
- Any municipality for whom NERSA has not granted an approval of an application supported by a Cost of Supply Study in accordance with the mentioned notice, shall be entitled to continue levying electricity rate tariffs as applicable during the 2023/2024 financial year.
- The court granted the non- compliant municipalities 60 days from the date of the order to submit their compliant applications.

It should be noted that during the budget public participation process, the issue of the tariff increases and the cost of supply study was pointed out in the submission of the Merafong Rate Payers Association as reported to the ward committee. The municipality has however ignored the inputs which has now the effect that the municipality is prohibited by an order of the High Court to implement the proposed tariff increases from 1 July 2024. The implementation of the proposed increases will be in contempt of court. A copy of the court order is **attached**.

Recommendations

- 1. That it be noted that no monthly financial report for May 2024 is available on the municipal website or could be obtained to report on it.
- 2. That it be noted that this is non- compliant with the applicable legislation.
- 3. That the court order of 28 June 2024 be noted and that the municipality is prohibited to implement the proposed electricity tariff increases as contained in the 2024/2025 budget and tariff By-laws.
- 4. That the ward councilor be informed to bring this to the attention of council and to ensure Council's compliance with the Court Order to avoid a case of contempt of court.

Report on the increasing number of minors in Fochville engaging in recyclable rubbish collection

Introduction

This report addresses a growing concern in Fochville regarding the increasing number of minors who do not attend school and instead collect recyclable materials for resale. These children are often seen in the early mornings on weekdays, collecting items before the refuse trucks arrive to pick up the dustbins. This situation raises significant issues related to child welfare, education, and community health and safety.

Background

Fochville, like the surrounding areas, has been experiencing socio-economic challenges that impact various facets of life, including education and child welfare. Over recent months, there has been a noticeable increase in the number of minors out of school during weekdays. - 4. Community Implications:
 - Public Health: The practice of scavenging through waste can contribute to public health issues, including the spread of diseases.
 - Crime and Safety: Unsupervised minors on the streets can become vulnerable to criminal activities, either as victims or participants.

Recommendations

- 1. Educational Interventions:
 - Reintegration Programs: Develop programs to reintegrate these minors into the school system, offering flexible learning schedules and catch-up classes.
 - Scholarships and Support: Provide financial assistance and scholarships to families in need to reduce economic pressures that prevent children from attending school.

2. Community Outreach:

- Awareness Campaigns: Conduct community awareness campaigns to highlight the importance of education and the risks associated with child labour.
- Parental Workshops: Organize workshops for parents to educate them on child rights, the importance of education, and available support services.
- 3. Policy and Enforcement:
 - Strengthen Child Labor Laws: Enforce existing child labour laws more rigorously and ensure that violators face appropriate penalties.
 - School Attendance Monitoring: Implement stricter monitoring of school attendance and follow-up on absenteeism cases with social services intervention.
- 4. Support Services:
 - Child Welfare Services: Increase the presence and capacity of child welfare services to address neglect and provide necessary interventions.
 - Economic Support Programs: Develop programs to provide economic support to families, reducing the reliance on children's income.

Conclusion

The increasing number of minors in Fochville engaging in recyclable material collection instead of attending school is a multifaceted issue that requires immediate and comprehensive action. Action Plan

- 1. Immediate Needs Assessment: Conduct a survey to assess the number of children involved and their specific circumstances.
- 2. Task Force Formation: Create a task force comprising educators, social workers, and community leaders to develop and implement intervention strategies.
- 3. Funding Allocation: Secure funding from government and non-governmental organizations to support educational and welfare programs.
- 4. Monitoring and Evaluation: Establish a monitoring and evaluation framework to track the progress of interventions and make necessary adjustments.

By taking these steps, Fochville can work towards resolving this critical issue and ensuring a better future for its young residents.

- Rand Water No further feedback was received re the possible further water restrictions as a result of the account in arrears
- Residents very anxious re financial/billing system that is still not operational – Reports that it would have/should have been up and running at the end of March 2024 – No other feedback re this
- No section meeting minutes for this portfolio this month
- Library No feedback re maintenance/upgrades/books
- Eskom Overloading/Load Reduction still ongoing no feedback re this and or possible schedules as requested by community
